## Introduction

On Saturday 31 May 2008 the Save Victoria Baths Campaign Group held a Free Fun Day at Victoria Leisure Centre and Sneinton Market. They used this as a chance to start asking local people for their ideas about the future of Victoria Baths. 550 people completed the 'Future of Victoria Baths Survey' on the day. Throughout June 2008, a further 96 completed the same survey online at the Save Victoria Baths Campaign Group website ([www.savevictoriabaths.org.uk](http://www.savevictoriabaths.org.uk)).

Also at the Free Fun Day two smaller visual survey exercises were carried out. Between 79 and 86 people took part in the first, which was used to find out where people would like to see their new 'wet' and 'dry' leisure facilities built. 112 people took part in the second, which was used to find out which parts of the current Victoria Baths building they would like to see kept.

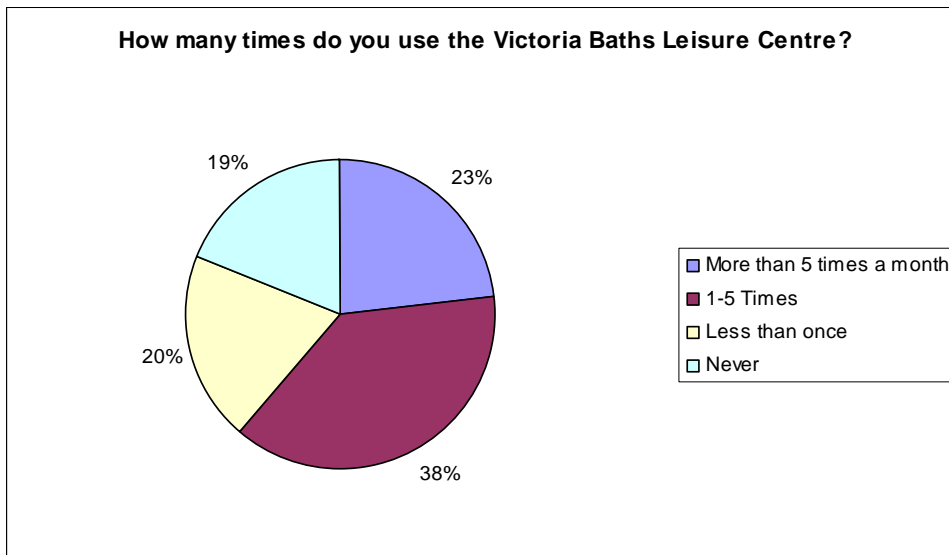

## 1. The 'Future of Victoria Baths Survey' results

A total of 646 surveys were completed (see appendix 1 for a blank copy of the 'Future of Victoria Baths Survey'). The results are as follows:

### 1. Frequency of use



**Most people use the baths between 1-5 times a month. Other rates of use were fairly evenly split.**

### 2. 'If you answered NEVER, what would make you start using the Centre?'

This was an open question. The comments people made have been listed below:

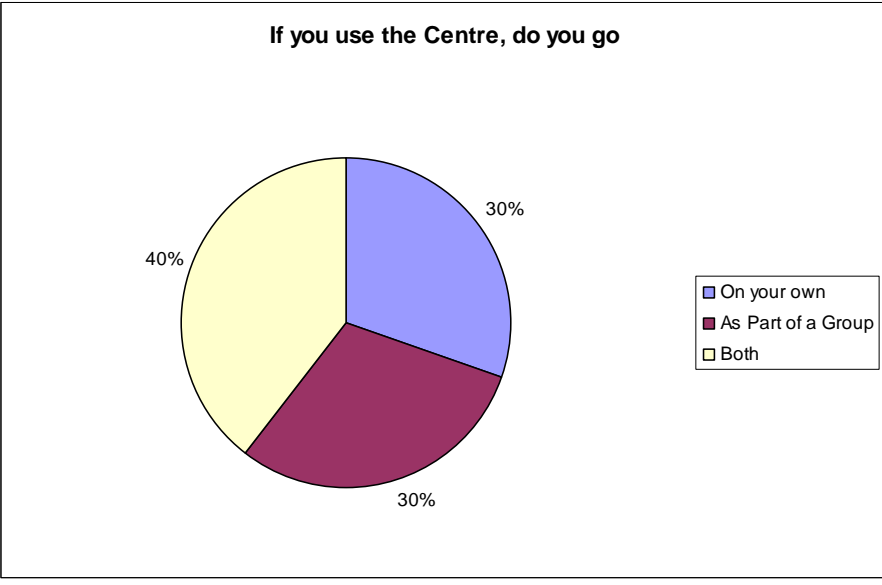

- Upgrade facilities

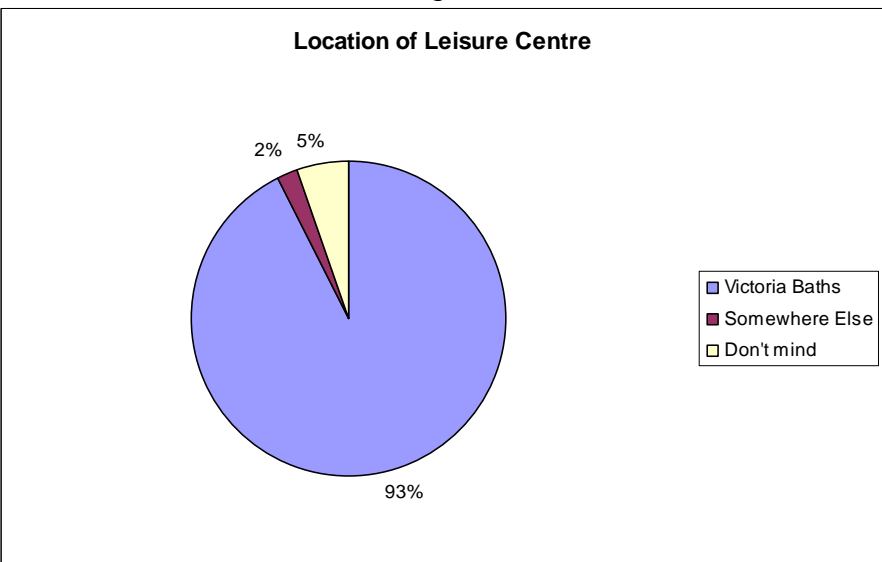
- Too far, not local

The results were evenly balanced between people using the Centre alone or with others.

4. 'Would you rather see Nottingham City Council put the money they promised into making Victoria Baths better, or building a new Leisure Centre somewhere else?'



93% of people want the money to be used to make Victoria Baths better.



## 5. 'Which bits of the current Victoria Baths building would you like to see kept?'

This was an open question. The results have been grouped together to give total numbers for each bit people wanted kept. Where people have made extra comments they have been listed underneath.

ALL OF THE BUILDING = 139

(Additional comments include:

- the character is great
- architectural value
- just modernized
- all of it, money that has not been invested over the years, hence the dilapidated state now
- a lovely old building

- all of it as it is an old building and just needs restoring

- I go swimming, use the gym and use the badminton courts

- All of it. It is a large building which has the potential to be used for several different events
- The whole building is beautiful on the outside. I find it really interesting. But in general I'd like to see it all kept. I think it just needs renovating.
- It is a jewel in the City's crown, albeit a dulling one. It has character and identity that is a refreshing and increasingly unique quality amongst the slew of faceless and sterile public buildings in the City and beyond.
- All especially parts that are 150 years old and a local landmark it is disgusting to demolish it
- Existing facilities

### MOST / AS MUCH OF THE BUILDING AS POSSIBLE = 17

- The Building is of great Architectural interest and suits the character of Sneinton market and surrounding Buildings. It would be a great shame for Nottingham City Council to decide to demolish such a lovely building and piece of Nottingham heritage. It would be great to expand the facilities at Victoria Baths, maybe adding a new extension, which does meet all DDA requirements and allows modern design to work with old. This may well cost more, but I certainly feel this would be the best solution for Victoria Baths.

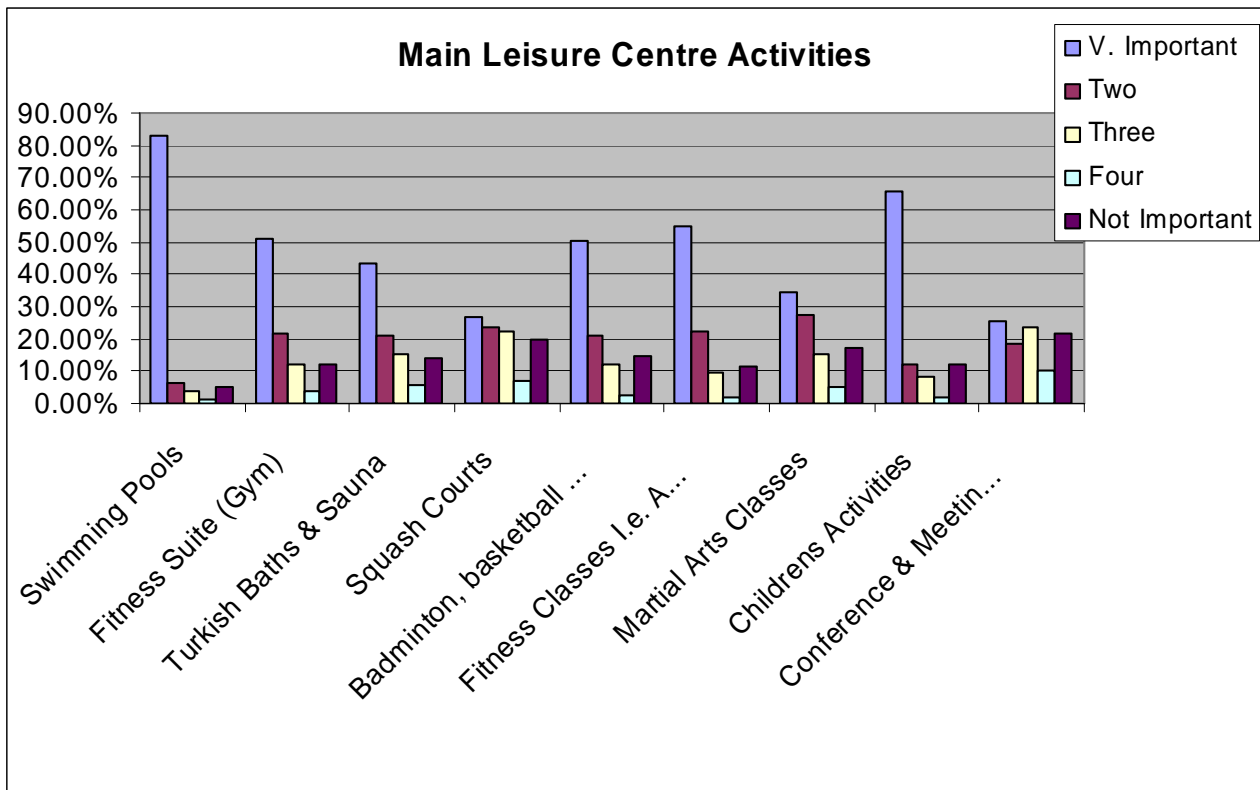

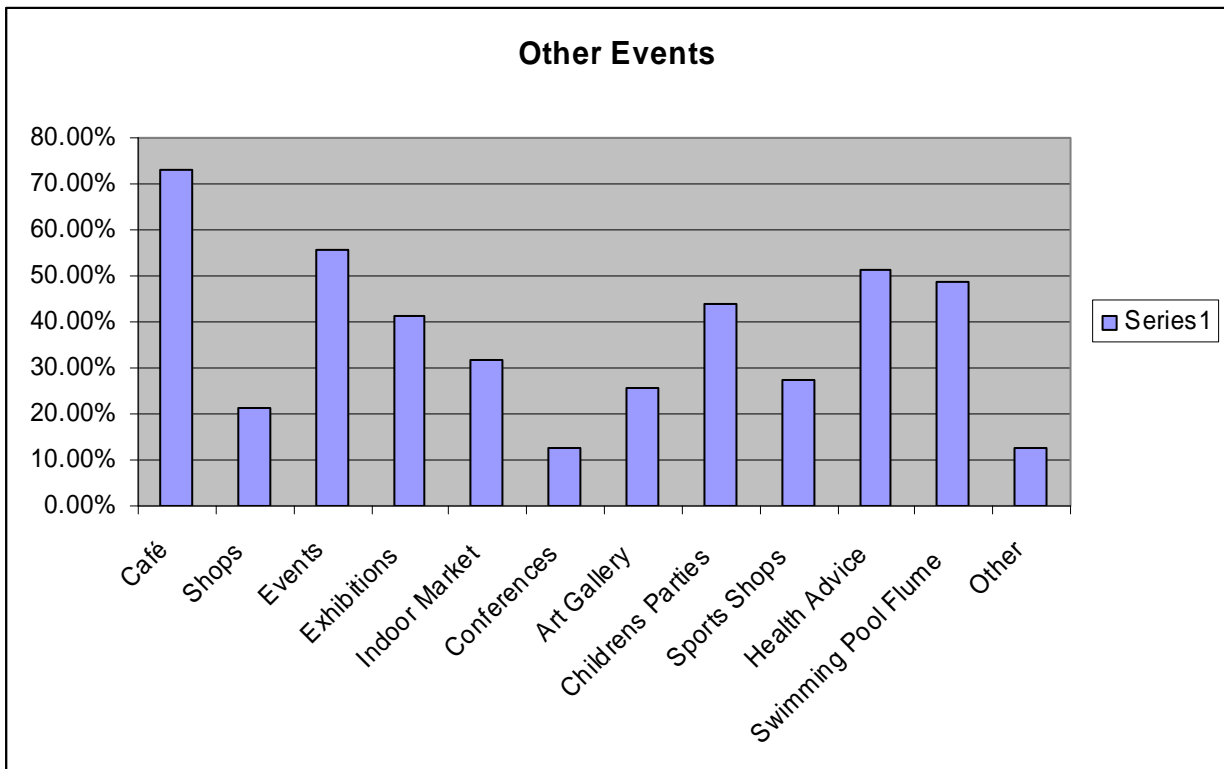

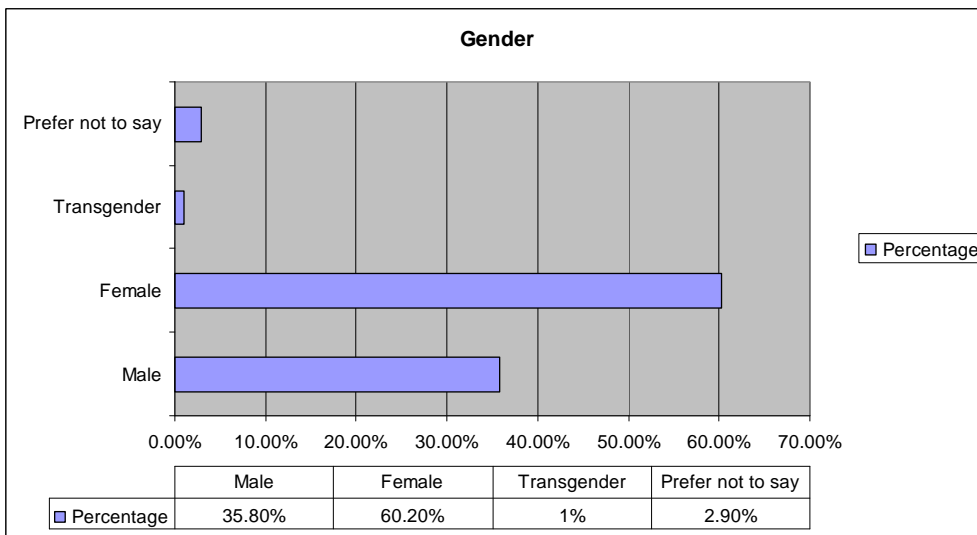
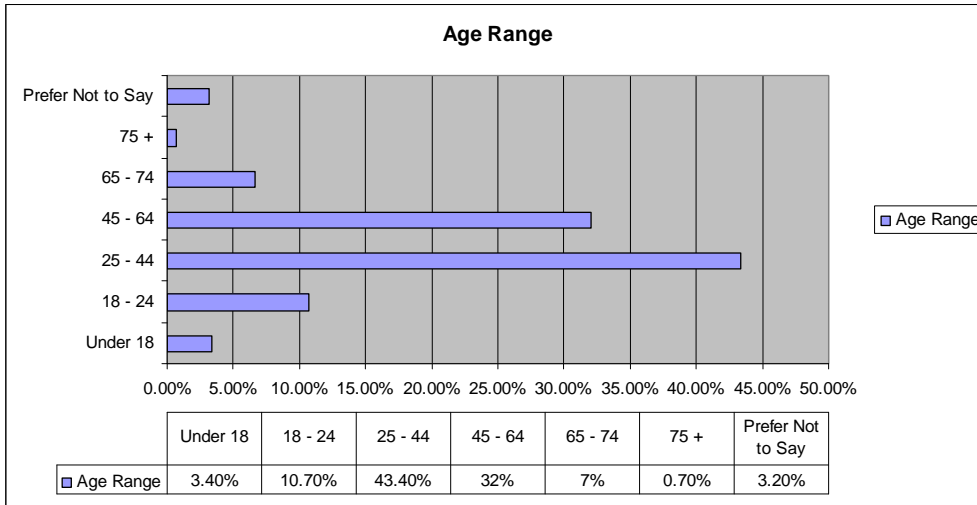
## 7. 'What other things would you like to see happening at Victoria Baths?'

**72% of people wanted to see a 'Café' at Victoria Baths, making it the most popular extra thing requested. The next four most popular things were 'Events' at 55%, 'Health Advice' at 51%, 'Swimming Pool Flume' at 48% and 'Children's Parties' at 44%.**

## Key Findings of the 'Future of Victoria Baths Survey'

- 1) When asked, almost everyone (93%) wanted the Council to spend the money on making Victoria Baths better, rather than building a new leisure centre elsewhere.
- 2) A large number of people said they wanted all of the current Victoria Baths building kept (139 people).
- 3) Many people wanted, and had strong views about, keeping all the historical and Victorian parts of the building - seeing it as part of Nottingham's heritage.
- 4) Of the historical parts there were a very large number of requests to retain the Clock Tower.
- 5) There was also popular support for keeping the frontage / façade of the building.
- 6) Most people felt the most important facilities in the current building were the Swimming Pools (158 people).
- 7) Keeping the Turkish Baths was also popular.
- 8) The Sports / Main Hall (which used to be known as the Oval Pool), also had a lot of support.

## 2. Siting of 'Wet' and 'Dry' facilities pin board exercise results

People who came to the Free Fun Day were asked to mark on a pin board where in Nottingham they would like 'wet' and 'dry' facilities built. People were given red and blue pins to do this with blue pins for 'wet' facilities and red pins for 'dry' facilities. Between 79 and 86 people took part. See appendix 2 for an image of the completed pin board). The results are given below:

**Victoria Leisure Centre came out as overwhelmingly the most popular place for both 'wet' and 'dry' facilities – although it should be remembered that this survey was about the future of Victoria Baths and so it's likely to have had an impact on the results.**

### **3. Parts of the current Victoria Baths building people wanted to see kept**

People who came to the Free Fun Day were asked to take part in a 'dotocracy' exercise. They were given three coloured dots with which to mark their first, second and third choices for which parts of the existing Victoria Baths building people would like to see kept. 112 people took part. See appendix 3 for an image of the completed 'dotocracy' exercise. The results are given below:

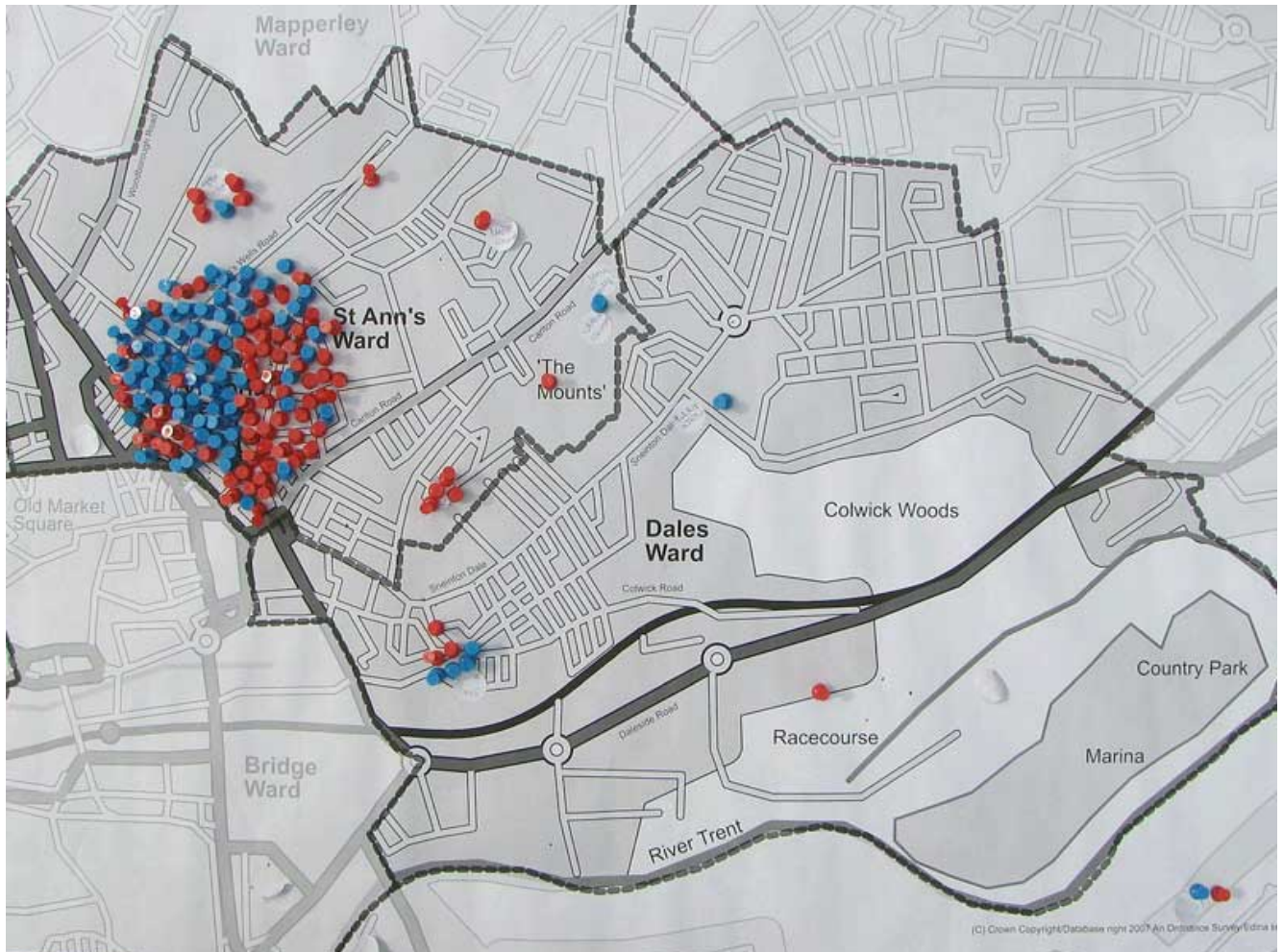
